Sr. Mercedes celebrated her 100th birthday this May. She has dedicated her life to learning and in particular to the enhancement of science education in Cork. She was one of the founding members of the Irish Science Teachers Association (ISTA) who held weekly meetings at St. Als for many years. Sr. Mercedes made the progressive move to introduce physics to an all girls school in the 1960's. Physics, Chemistry and Biology are still deeply rooted in the core of the curriculum at St. Als and this is no doubt down to her legacy. We celebrate her life and thank her for her enlightened forward thinking.

St Aloysius School has a long history of success in the field of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) and we are particularly grateful to the role that Sr Mercedes played in promoting science and maths for young girls of Cork city at a time when girls were not generally offered or encouraged to study these subjects. Sr Mercedes birthday coincided with the amazing success of Manahil and her team in representing their schools and country at the EOES 2022 in the Czech Republic and bringing home a silver medal for their hard work. Both women are an inspiration to the students of St Al's as we continue the great tradition of pursuing an interest in and careers in STEM!



Young Social Innovators (YSI)






This was St. Als first year taking part in Young Social Innovators (YSI). We must congratulate and thank our passionate, dedicated students for making it such a success! YSI is a fantastic programme allowing students to explore social issues before choosing one issue to reduce, eliminate or spread awareness about. Here is a message from the YSI team explaining what their project was about:

"Our social innovation was to help create a fairer world for all creatures and to help preserve habitats in our community. We did this by making posters that we displayed in school to educate students on the importance of wild animals in the ecosystem, to remind them that we are part of the ecosystem and to give them tips on how they can look after the wild animals in their area. We also raised money to give to the Irish WildLife Trust and painted a mural at the front of the school to remind people of the importance of looking after our local wildlife. We also want to improve wildlife habitats on our school grounds so we asked that native tree and plant that support bees and butterflies be planted in our new garden.

Climate change is a huge problem which cannot be solved with our project alone. However, our innovation promotes positive environmental changes. Our project focused on promoting life on land and life below water as we educated people on how to care for these animals that work together to keep our world healthy. For example: bees, butterflies and bats are all pollinators. They pollinate plants and help in food production so we should care for them by maintaining habitats, avoiding pesticide use and minimizing our waste and pollution. If we didn't have these cute, little animals and insects we would not be able to grow food and our natural world would become even more unbalanced.

Social change takes time but we feel like we made a difference in our community with our project and we learned so much in the process".





BLAST

St. Aloysius School were delighted to have been chosen as one of the schools to take part in the BLAST initiative. The students of TY art worked alongside artist Carol Healy who is a visual artist that lives in Cork City.

Carol worked with us over a series of drawing workshop classes from February to April 2022. These workshops included a wide variety of activities such as large-scale expressive drawings, sensory drawings invoking touch, sight and sound, tactile self-portraits through touch and blind drawing with the use of mirrors

Zinah commented on the overall experience "It was a different take on traditional art classes. Very interesting to see a different side of art that we normally wouldn't study. Very fun experience". Viktoria and Elizabeth commented on their experience of drawing with a partner: Viktoria "I thought drawing with a partner was fun because you could interact with other classmates while enjoying art". As is the case with all our footballers and camogie players this year, this year's first years were an absolute pleasure to coach with their commitment and willingness to learn pointing towards a bright future for sport in the years to come!

Student Council









The Student Council has had a very active year meeting each Monday to plan and prepare for events, discuss issues and policies and help find solutions to be part of making the school an inclusive and caring place. The group was made up of over 30 representatives from across all six year groups with meetings chaired by the Head Girl and Deputy Head Girl, Christiana and Alma. Every representative helped to bring ideas and highlight student issues at our weekly meetings and to act as the formal messenger between students and staff.

It was a difficult year with pandemic stresses and Covid restrictions still in place, the Student Council played its part to keep up school spirits and get students talking about other things. On a more formal level, we gave feedback on the **code of behaviour**, worked on the **role of the prefects**, members were involved with the **10:20 small break bell**; the **borrowing of sports equipment** at breaktime; the **supply of sanitary products** in more convenient places for students; and the **CEIST conference.**

A wide range of activities and fundraising events were organised by the student council. Over the course of this year we organised 10 no-uniform days which raised over €5,000 for school funds and charities including the Vincent de Paul and the Irish Red Cross. In November, we organised the "Creative Classrooms Competition". with winning classes getting a pizza party for their stunning classrooms. Our no-uniform day in January was celebrated with "Culture Day". While all of our students live in Cork, many of our students have connections to other countries. On Culture Day, students dressed up in traditional clothes, cooked food from their countries and talked to their classes about traditions and celebrations from these countries not forgetting Cork and Ireland. In February, they organised a tribute to friendship and love for St. Valentine's Day with a heart for each student. There was an 80's/90's no-uniform day organised in conjunction with the Smile Committee for Wellbeing Week. In March, Lá Fheile Pádraig was to be celebrated but the war in Ukraine had just started. Out students have a great sense of social justice and immediately asked that the money raised would go to the Irish Red Cross to help with the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine, €1,000 was generously donated. In April, we teamed up with the Green Schools Committee had been working tirelessly to obtain a Green Flag. We themed this no-uniform day as "Green Day" to help raise awareness on recycling and sustainability. In May, our last no-uniform day of the year we had the theme of friendship and summer colours. We wanted students to reflect and remember the friendships they kindled over the year and the friends that were moving on from St. Als particularly our Leaving Certificate students.

The Student Council play a hugely important role in the St. Als community creating a steadfast and trusted student voice. Thank you to Ms S O'Donovan and all the students that give so much of their time for the school community.

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


Annual Awards Day
